PRONUNCIAMENTO.

The Voters of the Second Senatorial District of the State of Nebraska:

Gentlemen:-The delegates to the People's Independent convention that was held at Tecumseh August 19, 1896, placed me in nomination as a candidate for state senator, and the nomination I reluctantly accept. My reluctance is not because I do not appreciate the honors, nor because I am unwilling to act my part in the efforts for good government, but because of the fact that so far have political campaigns and legislative proceedings departed from what they should be that I would prefer not to participate therein, aud cannot participate in either in such a manner as to conform to the beauideal.

The campaign of brass bands, red lemonade, twofor cigars and manufactured prejudice is the campaign in which many voters lose sight of the issues and needs of the times, and are carried away by excitement. It is the opposite of a campaign of education in which voters look at matters dispas. sionately and vote according to the dictates of their better judgment.

Again in the excitement of a national campaign we are apt to forget the questions that most concern us in the affairs of our state and county, and in selecting men to represent us in our state legislature we are prone to ask: "Is he for free silver?" "Is he a protectionist?" etc., instead of "Will he look to the interest of the people in each and every measure before the legislature, or will be give his best efforts to some matters purely partisan, purely local or purely profitable to himself?" "Will he be an honest representative, or will he be ready to bias legislation in the interest of greed and averice?"

It is stated upon the best of authoris ty that the expenditures for our state government including the appropria tions for the proper maintainance of our eleemosynary institutions are dous ble what they should be. Are there no wrongs to right, no expenditures to curtail, no wastes to check, and no frauds to be anearthed that the wrong may be righted?

Again, it is publicly charged, and the charge goes unchallenged, that corruption and venality stalk abroad, bias legislation and influence officials, Shall these things go unchecked, yea, unnoticed, while we devote our time to wrangling over national questions upon which the state legislation can have but a remote and indirect bearing? Would it not be as well to demand that reform and economy be brought about and practiced at home as well as abroad?

For the past ten years I have contended that unless it was the election of United States senators, there has never been a questien or issue in the state in which republicans and demoerats stood in diametrical opposition, or one that has been settled by a straight party vote; yet every campaign has been fought on party lines and the voters have rejoiced or feit regrets over party victory, while the wrongs done by corrupt men or negligent officials have been overlooked or charged up against the political party. Are we willing that this state of affairs shall continue, or shall we endeavor to at least reduce the number and guard against the continuance of the evils of which we complain

I am for W. J. Bryan for president, J. H. Broady for congress, Silas A.
