The election in Nemaha precinct re-
sulted in a victory for the republicans,
every republican candidate receiving a
majority with the exception of two
road crossers. The election board
consisted of W T Russell, James A
Titus and Chas Anderson as judges of
election and W W Sanders and Chas F
Zook as clerks of election. On account
of the lengthy ticket and the amend-
ments the count was not completed
until after six o'clock Wednesday
morning. Two hundred and thirty-
nine votes were cast. The following
