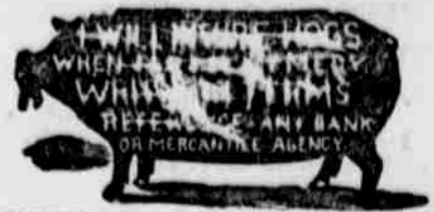
C. Shuck, proprietor of the Nemaha Valley Berkshire farm, won the following premiums on his hogs at the Auburn and Salem fairs:
