A short time ago J. W. Cranmer & Co's. clothing store at Auburn was broken into and about \$125 worth of clothing taken. Four men were arrested at Nebraska City for the offense and most of the clothing recovered. Three of the men plead guilty to the charge of burglary, and last Saturday Judge Stull sentenced two of them to three years in the penitentiary and one to two years. They claim to be from Chicago.

Leslie Woodward and Clarence Aynes had a lively experience with their horses near Brownville Wednesday afternoon. The train passed them when near the track, and the horse objected seriously to being so near the engine. Leslie in some manner got on the opposite side of a barb wire fence from the other members of the outfit, the horse got down, and as the train passed Clarence was making desperate efforts to keep him down. No serious damage was done.

The city officials of Auburn have been having trials and tribulations recently. Some time ago suit was brought in district court to compel Otto Juel to open a street he had been using for years. The city gained the suit, but Juel's attorney appealed the case. Pending the hearing of the new trial the mayor ordered the street commissioner to open the street. When this was attempted the mayor, J. W. Darrab, Street Commissioner C. J. Harnes and Marshal Joe Colby were arrested for contempt of court and committed to jail Friday of last week. Their attorney applied to Judge Stull for their release, but he refused to order them released unless they would give bond to keep the peace, but this they refused to do. A. J. Burnham, their attorney, then went to Lincoln and applied to the supreme court and to the district judges of Lancaster county for a writ of habeas corpus, but was refused. He went to Beatrice before Judge Letton, but this judge also refused to interfere. Tuesday afternoon the city officials gave the bond required and were released. They had lots of company in jail, as there were fifteen prisoners confined there.
