Here is a statement from Ex-Gov-
ernor Hoard that is worth its weight in
gold says the Humboldt, Ia, Republi-
can. He says he will give as much
pound for pound for corn fodder as for
timothy hay; and he adds that a ton of
corn contains four or five times as
much milk-producing food as a ton of
hay. Here is a statement worth con-
sidering. First, that a pound of corn
fodder is worth a pound of the best
timothy hay. If this is true and Hoard
has tested it as well as others, what a
tremendous waste there is to our coun-
try. And yet we see all about us mil-
lions of tons of the best fodder waste
blown away by the winds. Second-
ly, he says that a ton of corn con-
tains four or five times the milk-pro-
ducing qualities of a ton of hay. Corn
is worth, say 20 cents a bushel. Tim-
othy hay cannot be had for much less
than five dollars a ton. This would
make it cost as much as 35 bushels of
corn, and yet we find hundreds of men
buying hay at from four to five dollars
for feed for cows. Why not feed more
straw for roughage sprinkled over with
corn meal and get more milk? Or feed
more corn fodder cut no finer than wet
and sprinkle with meal, and get as
Hoard says, more than double the milk.
Our farmers need awakening on this
subject. They have got so accustomed
to feeding hay and a little bran, that
they can't think of any other way.
They have not considered the feed
question properly. It will not be
many years before our fodder by the
load will be sold on our streets as hay
is now. Strict economy will compel it.
