Died.—At the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Eliza Castor, 6½ miles west of Nemaha, Saturday morning, May 7th, 1898, Mr. Levi Johnson, aged 73 years.

The deceased has been gradually failing for the past year. A few weeks ago he was taken sick with catarrhal fever, and in his enfeebled condition he was not able to withstand its ravages. Mr. Johnson was one of our oldest citizens, arriving in Nemaha in June, 1855, with J. P. Hoover and his father, Dr. Hoover, and others. He lived here and in the vicinity the most of the time since that date, and had an extensive acquaintance.

The funeral services were held at the M. E. church Sunday at 11 o'clock a. m. Rev. J. P. Waldron preached the funeral sermon. The church could not hold the friends who met to pay their last respects to the deceased.

Mr. Bantz was highly respected by the entire community. His cheerful greeting will be missed by all.

The funeral services were held at the M. E. church in Nemaha Tuesday, May 10th, at 11 o'clock a. m. Rev. C. H. Gilmore preached a fine sermon. The singing by Messrs. Melvin, Dorram, Rumbaugh and Crother and Misses Maud Minick, Minnie May, Veva Clark and Ethel Paris was excellent and was greatly appreciated. The church was crowded and a great many were not able to get in. The casket was covered with wreaths of beautiful flowers.

The bereaved wife and children have the sympathy of all.

To the many friends and neighbors who were so kind and attentive during the sickness of Mr. Bantz, to those who looked after the arrangements for the funeral, and to the members of the choir the relatives of the deceased desire to return sincere thanks.

Mrs. C. M. Kauffman died Sunday, May 8th, 1898, at the residence near Brownville. Mrs. Kauffman has been suffering from a complication of diseases for some time. Saturday night she was apparently feeling as well as usual. Sunday morning she could not be awakened. Physicians were called but she never regained consciousness, dying that evening. The funeral services were held at the residence at 2 o'clock the next day, Rev. C. H. Gilmore preaching the sermon. The deceased came to Brownville with her husband in 1868.
