STEALING TRADE-MARKS.

American Manufacturers Are Made to Suffer Under the Laws of Denmark.

The trade-mark of a Boston firm has been appropriated in Denmark, and Mr. Jutes Blom, the American viceconsul at Copenhagen, has made the following report of the case to the state department:


'The said firm has, for over a quarter of a century, been selling its goods (peerless gloss for shoes) in Denmark, and has built up quite a large trade, the article now being for sale in almost every shoemaker's store throughout the kingdom. A Danish manufacturer, in the same line of business, recently thought it a good idea to imitate the labels and also the bottles used by the American firm, having found out that it had not registered its trade-mark here, although it is registered in the United States and Great Britain. The labels used by the imitators are in Danish, and bear his name, but otherwise they are identical with the American firm's labels and bottles. This 'counterfeit' was registered here at the Danish trade-mark registration office, and, according to law, duly advertised in the Danish newspapers. No objection was raised within the four months after registration, as stipulated by law, and the said trade-mark is now the Danish manufacturer's preperty." Mr. Blom also states that the Americaas wishing to register their trademarks in Denmark must be represented there by an attorney. A Danish consul in the United States must witness the signing of a power of attorney intended to be valid in Denmark.
