While sitting in a chair putting on the overshoes he suddenly fell forward, striking against the oven door to the cook stove. His wife tried to raise him up but could not and ran to the road and called to John White to come over. Mr. White ran over and carried Mr. Thompson into the sitting room and laid him on the lounge. He breathed a couple of times and was dead. His death was due to heart failure due to old age and a general breaking down of the system.

Mr. Thompson came to Nebraska in 1865, and two or three years later bought the farm northeast of town which he owned until two or three months ago, when he sold it to Lester Peabody. He was born and raised in Ohio, but came to Nebraska from Iowa. He leaves a wife and four children—D. J. Thompson, who recently moved to southern Missouri, Mrs. C. A. Curtis, Mrs. W. W. Relf and Mrs. J. H. Seid.

The funeral services will be held at the Methodist church Saturday, May 27th, at 2 o'clock p. m. Rev. C. H. Gilmore will preach the sermon.
