Nebraska's First Daily Paper.
 The News has always claimed that it was the oldest daily paper in Nebraska, either during territorial times or since the admission of Nebraska into the Union as a state. However the history of Nebraska teaches that the News was not, but that Brownville, Nemaha county, has the distinguished honor of publishing the first daily paper in the territorial times. For a few weeks in 1857 a small daily sheet named the Snort was issued from the Advertiser office under the editorial supervision of Langdon & Goff, the latter now being a resident of this city. Judge D. T. Goff, "Old Eye" was a legal tender in payment of subscriptions. A score of issues was enough to send the little paper to the tomb of Capulets. The Snort was the first daily paper ever issued in Nebraska.—Nebraska City Press.
