A fine Kentucky jack, will make the season at my barn, west of Nemaha.

JUDGE MAMMOTH is a dark iron gray in color; weighs 1000 pounds; is 15 1/2 hands high, and breeds blacks and bays.

JUDGE MAMMOTH was foaled in June, 1881, and bred by Wilsie and Rankin; he was sired by the noted Kentucky jack, Mammoth the 4th; he by Mammoth the 3rd; first dam by Hamilton's Mammoth the 2nd; second dam by Hamilton's Mammoth; third dam by Imported Mammoth; fourth dam Imported Jennett. Judge Mammoth's dam was Miss Mulkey, sired by Judge Harms' Mammoth Gray Jack; second dam, a very fine Jennett of Mr. Mulkey's. \$1500 was refused for Mammoth the 4th when an old jack. He is the sire of two-year-old mules which weigh 1,100 to 1,200 pounds. Judge Harms' Jack sold for \$1,000 at the age of 13 years.
