Wind Cave, South Dakota.

Republican County Convention.

Pursuant to an order made by the republican county central committee in and for Nemaha county, Nebraska, at a meeting held in the city of Auburn, Nebraska, July 28, 1900; a republican county convention is hereby called to meet at the Court House in the city of Auburn, Nebraska, on Monday, August 13, 1900 at 10:30 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of electing delegates to the Senatorial and Representative convention of the counties of Johnson and Nemaha, and placing in nomination a county ticket for the following offices, to-wit:

- Two Representatives,
- One County Attorney,
- One County Commissioner for the second Commissioner District, and to transact such other business that may come before the convention.

It is further ordered by said committee, that the basis of representation be as follows: One delegate for each twelve votes or fraction thereof cast for Hon. E. J. Burkett for congressman at the general election held November 8, 1898.

It is further ordered by said committee, that the primaries be held Saturday, August 11, 1900, at the usual voting place, and at the hour herein after mentioned, and the several voting districts and precincts will be entitled to representation as follows:

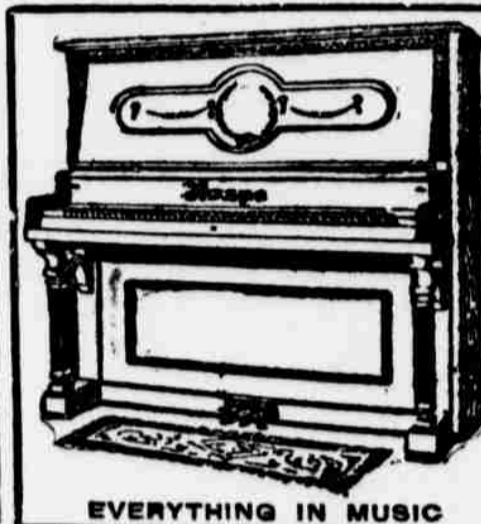
