The city had been captured and sacked by Sherman's army in its march to the sea, and this paper was picked up by Mr. Gilbert on the grounds of the capitol at that time. It is dated at Halifax July 8th, 1799. Abraham Hodge publisher. There are four pages of three columns each. The paper is 17x25 inches in size and the subscription price is "2 & 1/4 Dol. per Ann." In the "latest foreign news" are dispatches from Paris dated April 18th. Among the advertisements is one offering a reward for a runaway slave. The paper is addressed to "J Perkins," the ink being almost as black and as plain as if written only a short time ago.
