 Rev. A. V. Wilson writes us that
 Dr. Van Fleet will preach at the Meth-
 odist church a Nemaha Saturday night

It is fully conceded even by the
 most rabid fusionist that Dietrich and
 the whole republican state ticket is
 elected and that the legislature is re-
 publican. Dietrich's plurality is about
 800. The other candidates get a con-
 siderably larger plurality. McKinley
 got a plurality of about 8,500. The
 fusionists elected the congressmen in
 the Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth dis-
 tricts by small pluralities.

Mrs. Smith, of Baldwin, Kansas, lec-
 tured in the Methodist church Thurs-
 day night on foreign missions. Mrs.
 Smith was a missionary for ten years
 at Rangoon, Burma, her husband being
 pastor of the English speaking church
 in that city and also having supervision
 of the missionary work in Burma.
 They returned to this country last
 spring. Mrs. Smith's health having
 failed. Mrs. Smith gave an exceedingly
 interesting lecture.

The religious meeting that was to
 have been held at Auburn last Satur-
 day night was postponed until Wednes-
 day night of this week on account of
 the storm. On the latter date they had
 a big time. There was a parade headed
 by the tableaux club, fireworks, etc.,
 and a sermon by Hon. Paul Clark of
 Lincoln and Hon. Frank Martin of
 Fairbury. Flour, rice, etc., was
 sold for every one venturing on the
 streets and the next morning the side-
 walks and streets were as white as if
 there had been a snow storm.

Gov. Leroy F. Britt died at his
 home in Omaha Tuesday night of a
 week after a protracted illness. He
 was 54 years old at his death. Dr.
 Britt was one of the prominent Meth-
 odist ministers of this state for many
 years, retiring from the ministry five
 years ago on account of poor health.
 He was presiding elder of the Hastings
 district one term and of the Nebraska
 City district two terms. Dr. Britt
 had many friends in this county who
 will be pained to learn of his death.
 He leaves a wife, one son and two
 daughters.
