The twenty-seventh session of the Nebraska legislature was called to order at Lincoln Tuesday. J. W. Armstrong of Nemaha county was elected temporary speaker of the house and called that body to order. William G. Sears of Burt county was elected permanent speaker. Albert D. Gilmore of Auburn was elected first assistant clerk of the house—the only position given to Nemaha county in either house in the permanent organization.

In the senate C. F. Steele of Jefferson county was elected president pro tem. In the appointment of committees Peter Berlet was made chairman of the committee on Miscellaneous Corporations.

Attorney General Smyth left several days ago for Washington where he was called to attend some preliminary litigation growing out of the case of the state of Missouri versus Nebraska, which is now pending in the supreme court of the United States. The fickle nature of the Missouri river is the cause of the controversy between the two states. McKissick's island which the inhabitants of Nemaha county claim as their own was separated from the Nebraska side of the stream by a sudden shifting of the current. It is alleged that this was brought about by unknown parties digging a trench and otherwise interfering with the natural course of the river. The inhabitants of this small tract suddenly found themselves subject to the jurisdiction of the laws of Missouri when they most earnestly desired to reside in Nebraska. The attorney general claims that the tract of land still forms a portion of Nemaha county. He also denies that the boundaries of this portion of the state were definitely fixed at the time of the admission of Nebraska. An error in fixing the Missouri base line causes a wide difference in the surveys of the two states, the base line of the Nebraska survey being the 40th degree north latitude, while the base line of the Missouri survey is many degrees further south. This together with the digging of the ditch and the shifting of the channel is the cause of this change. According to this view the island is still a portion of Nemaha county and the residents subject to the jurisdiction of the Nebraska laws.—Lincoln News.

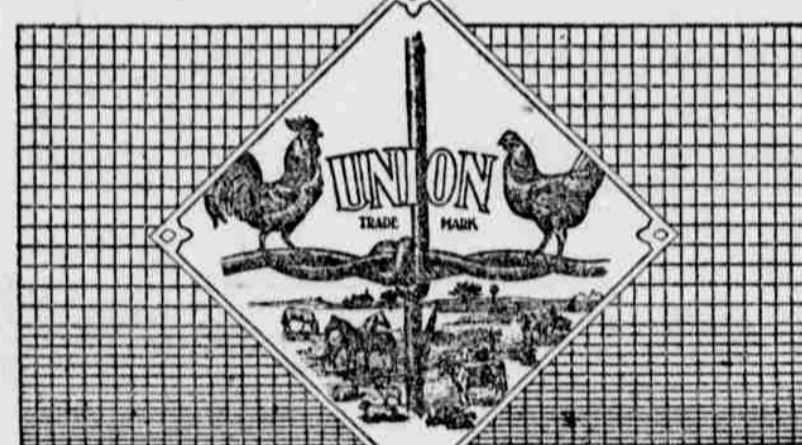
