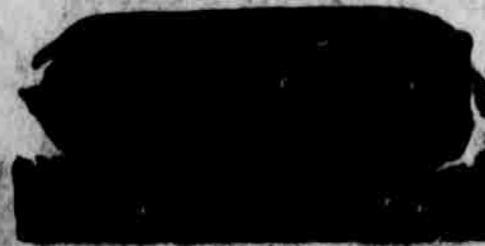

Valuable Collection.

Mr. Birt Hoover, of Nemaha City,
has spent many an evening and odd
spell in collecting and beautifying the
different kinds of wood which can
be found in the state and now he has
seventy-five varieties. He has several
hundred canes, a chair and a throne all
made from native timbers, shrubs and
vines, and the whole is worth a lengthy
study. The carving and turning are
done in a workman-like manner, and
the ornamenting, decorating and trim-
ming on the chair and throne are truly
artistic. One of the canes alone has
seventy-five kinds of wood in its make-
up and is really a thing of beauty.

Smallpox at St. Deroiin

Smallpox has broken out in St. De-
roin and vicinity. It is said one per-
son who had the disease attended one
of the political meetings and thus
spread it throughout the community.
The school teacher took the disease,
and two children of Wm. Fillmer, whose
wife is the postmistress, also have the
disease. Fillmers live in a house of
only two rooms and the postoffice is
kept there. The disease is very light
and little has been said about it. Tues-
day evening County Commissioner
Stevenson was phoned regarding the
matter and he had Dr. E. H. Dillon, of
Auburn, go to St. Deroiin Wednesday
morning. The doctor had the disease
a few months ago and ought therefore
to be qualified to tell what it is, and he
says there are twenty-five cases of ge-
nuine smallpox, though in a light form.
The commissioners have placed the
case in Dr. Dillon's care and he went
down Friday morning to establish a
quarantine. The mail has been stopped
and no mail is now received from or
sent to that postoffice but is held at the
Nemaha office. It is hoped the spread-
ing of the disease can be stopped.
