Mrs. Davidson Plasters of Brown-
ville died at the residence of her daugh-
ter, Mrs. M. S. McIninch of Auburn,
Saturday, April 12, 1902. Mrs. Plas-
ters had been suffering from a cancer
for some time and had been in a hos-
pital at Omaha for treatment. Several
weeks ago, when it was seen she could
not be helped, she started for home,
stopping with her daughter at Auburn,
and remaining there until her death.
The funeral services were held at the
home in Brownville Monday afternoon.

William A. Stevenson, an old resi-
dent of Nemaha county, was found
dead in bed Wednesday morning, April
16, 1902, at his home in London pre-
cinct. Mr. Stevenson, who was a
bachelor, had a family keeping house
for him, and also had a young man
working for him. The young man,
who slept in the same room with Mr.
Stevenson, got up Wednesday morn-
ing and did the chores. Breakfast was
then eaten, and after breakfast they
went to awaken Mr. Stevenson, when
it was discovered that he was dead.
He had evidently died without a strug-
gle as he was lying as if asleep. He
had worked all day Tuesday and eaten
a hearty supper, and was apparently as
well as usual.

Mr. Stevenson was 76 years of age.
He was one of the old settlers of this
county and had accumulated consid-
erable property. He leaves one brother
and one sister, John Stevenson and
Mrs. Tracey, both of this county.

The funeral services, conducted by
Rev. D. B. Lake, were held Thursday
at 10 o'clock a. m., at the Bethel M. E.
church, of which deceased was a mem-
ber, and the body laid at rest in the
Brownville cemetery.

One of the most interesting and in-
structive curiosities to be seen in the
state is the collection of the different
varieties of native wood that J. B.
Hoover has collected. He has a plat-
form on castors and on three sides of
the platform Mr. Hoover has made a
sort of lattice-work arrangement from
curiously twisted specimens of wood,
all native kinds, and on the inside
of this lattice-work over seventy canes
are standing, each a different kind of
wood grown in this county and nearly
all within a mile of Nemaha. The
canes are nicely polished and var-
nished. In the center of the platform
is a large arm chair made from native
wood, the arms and back being formed
of curiously formed wood ingeniously
interwoven. Mr. Hoover was many
years making the collection, manufactur-
ing the canes and putting together
the chair and platform. He is proba-
bly the best posted man in Nebraska
on native woods.
