Stella, a Neb., Mar. 21, 1903.—A fire which was discovered about half past four this morning in the basement of the old opera house, situated on the southeast corner of Main street burned everything in that block as far north as the postoffice which is of brick and intercepted the flames at that point. All of the buildings burned were frame.

The buildings burned were the opera house, occupied by Umler as a feed store, Umler's residence, Mrs. Umler's millinery, store Hoagland's restaurant, Bates harness shop, two vacant buildings and another feed store. All of the plate glass in the elegant brick blocks across the street was broken.

The loss is estimated at \$6,000, with only \$4,000 insurance. Stella has no fire protection and the bucket brigade could offer no adequate resistance to the progress by the flames, the fire continuing to spread on account of the strong south wind blowing at the time. So far as learned no one suffered personal injuries and the disaster was limited to the destruction of the property named above.
