**SIZE OF CHURCH HOWE'S JOB.**  
The promotion of Church Howe, as reported in press dispatches, will not alone be an honor but will also be an advance in prosperity and responsibility. At Antwerp he will be the highest consul representative of the country and in authority next below the minister. As the head of the consular department he will handle the business of consulates at Brussels, Ghent and Liege and two consular agents, who are of minor importance. In the city of Antwerp Mr. Howe will have a vice and deputy consul to relieve him in case he wishes to leave his territory. The salary of the office is \$3,500 and the official fees \$2,500. The former are government fees turned in for invoices, landing certificates and other similar services, and show a considerable volume of business, which, in turn indicates a heavy trade with the United States. The notarial fees are received for incidental services, not required by the government but which are retained by the consular officer. In Sheffield Mr. Howe was under the jurisdiction of Consul General Osborne at London, but in Belgium he is in turn the head of the service.—Omaha Bee.
