### KEEP THE JUDICIARY PURE

We have heretofore said but little relative to the candidacy of any of the candidates on the judicial ticket outside of E. O. Kretzinger, who we regard as wholly unsuited for the place. As no man has ever questioned the integrity or distinguished ability of W. H. Kelligar, in short, his fitness for the place, the question of his election is practically assured. Who then should be given second place? For reasons wellknown to our readers, it has been shown that Kretzinger's election would be a menace to the liberties of the people and the rights of litigants.

Judge Babcock is growing old, and is reaching a time in life when most men are in their dotage. Age alone ought to be a bar to a judicial office; having reached the age limit should be retired.

The only available candidate is C. F. Reavis of Richardson county. This fact induced us to go down Wednesday, when he was in Jefferson county and his father was in the northern part of the state, to investigate charges made against C. F. Reavis and as the Arbor State is in no sense a partisan paper, nor do we surrender our position by taking up and telling the truth about the candidacy of Frank Reavis.

The tactics being used to compass his defeat is disreputable beyond all precedent. We took time to inquire into his record, both as a citizen and an official. The fact that he was permitted in open convention to select his delegates to the district convention is proof to any unprejudiced mind that he has the respect of the people of the county in which he lives. Professional jealousy is at the bottom of the whole howl.

Frank Reavis is a brilliant young lawyer, and is generally arrayed on one side of most cases tried in the district court of Richardson county, and of course he has left many scars among the slain and wounded members of the bar at that barwick.

But the matter of persecution has been carried too far and he will receive two democratic votes for every republican vote he loses. He will go out of Richardson with a rousing majority and will carry Pawnee, Gage, Jefferson and Johnson counties.

Kelligar and Reavis will be the judges of this judicial district for the ensuing four years from Jan. 1, 1904.—Wymore Arbor State (Dem.)
