He got hold of some carbolic acid that was kept to disinfect the jail and drank lt. He was found by Sheriff Lawrence writhing in agony. Brott was convicted of burglary and sent to the penitentiary last fall, mainly on the testimony of the blood a hounds from Beatrice, who tracked Brott from the house robbed to his home. The supreme court reversed this verdict, deciding that the testis mony of the bloodhonnds was uot competent, and remanded the case back to the district conrt. Brott was brought back to Auburn and bas been in the county jail since that time.


