The funeral of Mrs. Letitia Strain was held at Cumberland Presbyterian church, three miles northwest of Nemaha, at 10 o.clock a. m. Saturday. The services were conducted by Rev. M. S. Foutch and interment was made in the Nemaha cemetery.
