HASTINGS, Nebr., Nov. 22—Rev. J. B. Wilson, a Methodist minister at Bladen, was rotten egged Monday night in the village street by unknown parties. Sports who got drunk at a wedding and who were scored Sunday by the preacher in his pulpit, are suspected of being responsible for the outrage.

The funeral of John Davies was held at the Methodist church at Brownville last Sunday at 2 o'clock p. m. Rev. G. W. Ayers read a brief statement of his age, etc., and then spoke touchingly of his acquaintance with Mr. Davies, his work in the church, his standing in the community, etc. He was followed by Rev. D. F. Rodabaugh of Peru, who was pastor at Brownville some thirty years ago, and an old friend of the deceased. The presiding elder, Rev. Geo. I. Wright, then closed this part of the service with brief remarks.

The church was crowded, many being present from Nemaha, Auburn and other places.

Mr. Davies was born in Wales in 1847, and came to Brownville in 1869, making that place his home since then. He united with the Methodist church in 1878, and had been an official member most of the time until his death. He leaves a wife, one son, and a stepdaughter.
