Gov. Frear, although of American birth, has spent nearly his entire life in Hawall. Born in Californa 45 years ago, he gracuated from Oahu college, Honolutu, and Yale, After graduating in law, he was made a circuit judge,
for Hawaii in 1893, and a few months later he was advanced to the supreme court of the islands, then under the provisional goverument. He was made a supreme court justice of the repubic when it was organized under President
Sanford B. Dole, and was offered the position of ninister of forelgn affairs and public instruction in 1899 , but declined the change to the cabinet, prefer-
ring to retain his place upon the supreme bench. He was made chief justice. and held that place until the annex
