The Government Examination of Baking Powders-Royal Officially Reported Pure.

The reports of the government analysts, as made public from time to time in the official reports, form useful subjects for study. A great deal of attention is devoted to the examination of baking powders, and very properly so, for they are articles of general use, possible information should be given to enable consumers to distinguish between the good and the bad.

A large number of these articles have been analyzed, the samples being collected from dealers in all sections. The impurities found were principally alum and lime, both unwholesome. The alum is used in place of cream of tartar because of its low cost. The lime, both tartrate and sulphate being found, was present from the use of improperly refined cream of tartar.

The analysts found and reported the Royal baking powder to be pure, free from lime, alum and phosphatic acid, and of high leavening strength. A complete analysis would undoubtedly have shown no baking powder except the Roval entirely free from some one of these objectionable ingredients. This, we presume, accounts for the lack of leavening powers in the other powders, as sometimes complained of by the cook, and for the bitter taste sometimes found in the biscuits so frequently complained of by ourselves.

The reasons for the chemical purity of the Royal baking powder were recently given in the New York Times, in an interesting description of a new method for refining argols, or crude cream of tartar. It seems that it is only under this process that cream of tartar can be freed from the lime natural to it and rendered chemically pure; that the patents and plant for this cost the Royal Baking Powder Company about half a million dollars and that they maintain exclusive control of the rights.

This official recognition of the purity and value of the Royal baking powder by the government will add to the already wide popularity of that article, and deservedly so.

Her face, though not strictly beautiful, is a most charming and delightful one, and her expression while usually grave and preoccupied, is constantly broken by smiles, which brighten her grey eyes and display a charming mouth of beautiful teeth. She is of medium height, and weighs perhaps one hundred and forty pounds. Her figure is plumb and pretty, and her gowns which are usually gray, black or dark purple in color, always fit it perfectly. Her hair is brown, and by its utter absence of grey tries still further with her appearance to conceal the fact of her grandmotherhood. She wears it twisted high on her head, and in a light curly wave over her brow. 
