One of the chief advantages of handling sheep is that it is practical to keep them constantly under your care, and much loss may be prevented which would occur if this was not the case. Another important point is that they will flourish on short range. Then they yield ready to will in the matter of breeding. You can change in the shortest possible time whenever the fashion in wool or flesh changes. Then, under the present demand for mutton, there is no necessity for having any old sheep on hand, as this class can be worked off from year to year and the flock kept young and thrifty.
