



ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE KEELEY INSTITUTE OF O'NEILL.

We, the undersigned, hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of becoming a body corporate under the laws of the state of Nebraska, and have made and subscribed the following articles of incorporation:

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be "The Keeley Institute of O'Neill." The principal place for the transaction of its business shall be at O'Neili. Neb.

ARTICLE II.

The special business of this corporation shall be the treatment of nervous diseases and the cure of the optum, liquor and tobacco habits and the purchase and sale of Dr. Leslie E. Keeley's "Chloride of Gold Remedies" in accordance with the terms of a contract and specifications between the Keeley Institute of Blair. Neb. and W. D. Mathews, M. D. Long, E. W. Adams, T. V. Golden and A. L. Towie of O'Neili. Neb.

ARTICLE III.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be \$20,000, divided into shares of \$100 each, the whole amount to be paid up and non-assessable at the commencement of business. No liability shall be contracted in excess of fifty per cent of the capital stock of the company.

ARTICLE IV.

The existence of this corporation shall be for ninety-nine years, unless sooner dissolved by a two-thirds vote of the stock-holders, said corporation to commence business at the date of filing these articles of incorporation.

ARTICLE IV.

The business of this corporation shall be conducted by a board of directors, five in number, to be elected by the stock-holders, such election to take place annually on the first Monday in January of each year, said directors to hold meetings at such time as the by-laws of this corporation may require. The qualifications of said directors shall be that they are stock-holder is entitled to one vote for each share of stock.
