DUQUESNE STRIKERS ASSAULT NON-UNION WORKMEN.

Illitia Proceed to the Scene and Restore Order-Warrants Issued for the Ringleaders—Telegraph Operators May Go Out-General Labor News.

HOMESTEAD, Pa., Aug. 6.-Stones vere used by a few strikers to prevent stampede at Duquesne yesterday. As result several persons were beaten nd the militia is in charge of the steel works there. Yesterday it became wident that a break was imminent. here were a number of departments ut of order and Supt. Morrison ordered Villiam Mileslagel, foreman of the nechanical department, to report with hirty men in the morning for work. ixty men who had led the strike, hearng of it, determined to stop the work. wenty Homestead men started for uquesne also about daylight to assist preventing any persons entering the

At 6 o'clock twelve deputy sheriffs, charge of Capt. Gray, were stationed the mill gate, and a crowd began to ather. By 7 o'clock it numbered 300. bout this time members of the mehanical department, in obedience to ne order of Foreman Mileslagel, arved with lunch pails, They were alted by the crowd, which was armed rith clubs and bowlders. Every man as ordered home with such threatenig demonstrations that the majority ed in terror. Foreman Mileslagel apeared at 9 o'clock and was about to nter the works, when a number of nen ordered him to leave. On his reusal, stones were thrown at him and e was knocked down, but not seriusly injured.

A telegram was dispatched by Capt. Gray to Brig.-Gen. Wiley, commanding the Second brigade, stationed at Homestead. He sent the Sixteenth regiment to the scene of disorder on a special train. It arrived just in time to prevent the mill gate being stormed.

Pfrishung, Pa., Aug. 6.-Last evening informations were made before Ald. Reilly of this city against fifteen participants in the riot at Duquesne. The warrants were issued and the constables will endeavor to make the arrests to-day. The alderman refused to give the names of the accused or the name of the prosecutor.

A Medical Library on a New Plan-A Novel Electric Road.

St. Louis, Aug. 8.—Librarians in other cities would stare with envy could they see the list of books which the public library will carry into its new quarters in the Polytechnic building, when it is finished. When the new library was first proposed, Librarian Fred M. Crunden had an idea by which he thought he could get for the library the most complete medical library in the country. He offered all the medical societies of the city the priviliges of the library for their members on condition that they turned over to him all their books to go into the cases as all their books to go into the cases as the property of the library. Each of the societies had an immense number of valuable books, which were poorly cared for, and they jumped at this chance, as Mr. Crunden thought they would. Medical books are very costly, as every young doctor who tries to buy them knows, and the lot that Mr. Crunden has thus obtained could not be duplicated for a hundred thousand

The proposed belt line around Forest Park is meeting with favor. The board of public improvements has to decide whether or not it shall be, and all of the members of the body want it. The only question is as to the company that shall have the franchise. It is suggested, to dispose of that obstacle, that the right to build the line be sold by the city at auction. It would bring several hundred thousand dollars, no doubt. There are plenty of electric roads to the park, but it is so big, and so much of it has purposely been left as nature made it, that most of the people who go out there never see one third of it, and leave it, after a short walk through the accessible parts of it walk through the accessible parts of it with a very wrong idea of its proportions. At present, only those who drive through the park in vehicles understand fully its beauty and extent, and a belt road around it would admit everybody to this delightful knowledge.

The wheelmen of St. Louis have just originated two novel plans for making the bicycle conspicuous in this city as a vehicle that can be both picturesque and useful. There are over two thousand wheelmen here now, and when they enter into any scheme unitedly they make it go. To show that the wheel can produce great spectacular effects, a score or more of the boys have got up a rocket corps which takes long night rides on the smooth roads around the city, the wheelmen dis-charging Roman candles and rockets as they go, a sort of flambeau battalion on cycles. The line of wheels, as they whirl down a long hill at full speed on a moonlight night, each one sending up to the heavens a stream of fire, is a most dazzling sight. They parade around the parks in this way, and dis-band at the club house. A military organization the wheelmen have established is designed to show that the wheel may be of use in time of war. In the drill, the boys carry heavy loads, and practise mounting and dismount-ing with their burdens.
