CURIOUS MINERALS.

Utah Possesses an Unusual Variety of Peculiar Metals.

The mountains and valleys of Utah are perfect.magazines of odd minerals, some found only sparingly in other places, while a great many kinds are plentiful there that are found in no other locality on the globe. "Tea-tite," a soft, resinous substance found in quantities in the Bear River mountains, was unknown to the mineralo gist prior to 1890, and is even now wholly unknown in other quarters of the earth. Experts who have given it thorough tests are of the opinion that it will finally become amber of the finest quality.

"Ozokerite," a species of natural mineral wax, a rarity elsewhere, is found in large quantities in this local-Minutes of previous meeting read and upon motion approved.

can do the courting, with the natural result that almost every one gets married. A similar practice to that in the Ukraine exists among the Zuni tribe of Indians. The woman does all the courting, and also controls the situation after marriage. To her belong all the children, and descent, including inheritance, is also on her side. The same custom prevails among the Vigrees, a tribe in Cabul, and the Nairs of Malabar. Among the Garo race of Abssam, in Northeast India, it is not only the privilege, but even the duty of the girl there to speak first.

A Snake Swallower. A wonderful story reaches us from

Japan, of a snake swallower who has outdone all forerunners in the art. Saito Tora-no-suke was one day breaking up some land, when he came upon a snake three feet long. Seizing it in his hands, he called out to his companions that if they would give him \$4 he would swallow the snake. HOW TO MAKE WOOD PULP.

After an Exhaustive Pickling Process a Cohesive Mass is Produced. The utilization of wood pulp has lately taken some new interesting forms, especially in the line of

ornamentation. The pulp is taken as it comes from the mill, and after being first fully dried or not, as circumstances may require, it is immersed in an indurating pickle, so called, with coloring if

This pickle is composed of any com-pound or solution capable of indurat-ing the mass, and, after the material is taken out of the pickle and thoroughly dried, it is run through a mill and ground sufficiently fine to insure a mixture of the particles which have not absorbed the indurating substance with the particles which are fully

The powdered pulp is then com-pressed, with the application of heat, in a mold or die, with the result of producing an article of manufacture composed of a homogeneous and cohesive mass of thoroughly indurated particles; and the objects produced in this manner may be polished or otherwise improved in their appearance as cording as may be desired.

Girls in Vienna.

The system carried out in Vienna for educating girls is certainly worthy of notice. They are kept at their studies until they are 15 years of age. They then go through a course of teaching in the pantry and the kitchen under some member of the family, or sometimes trained under cooks, for a year or two years.
