A NETWORK OF OCEAN CABLES.

arine Wires Around Everywhere in the World Except in American Wat The world is now so netted with cables, great and small and new ones are laid so frequently that there is much demand for the service of cable laying ships, says the New York Sun. A list of the world's cables, long and short, set down in tabulated form, occupies twenty large and closely printed pages. The cable map of the world prepared by the United States navy department shows that the Mediterranean is thickly netted with cables west of Malta. So is the North Atlantic between the thirtyeighth and fifty-fifth parallels. The North sea, the Red sea, and the Arabian sea have many cables. The only great unbridged spaces are the Pacific, the South Atlantic, and the great stretch of the Indian ocean between Madagascar and Australia. There is no considerable cable north of Stockholm or South of Nelson, New Zealand. The Black sea is completely girdled by land lines and crossed by one cable. The gulf of Mexico is crossed, though not at its widest by several cables, and the waters of the West Indies are becoming thickly netted with short

Coast communications in the United States and Europe are maintained by land lines, but in Africa, South America, and much of Asia the same thing is maintained by means of long or short cable loops. It thus happens that this country, although more thoroughly equipped with telegraphic lines than any other in the world, has a comparatively small amount of cable within her own waters. This may perhaps account in part for the fact that cable making is only just beginning to be an important industry in the United States.


The navy of the United states, however, has done a vast deal for the art of cable laying. Commander Sigsbee has invented a highly effective sounding machine for ascertaining the depth of the ocean-an absolutely necessary preliminary to cable laying. Lieutenant Commander L. Tanner of the navy has devised an ingenious case for deep-sea thermometers and also improved a thermometer frame invented by an Italian naval officer. The naval depart-ment has also issued an elaborate treatise on cable laying, and made soundings for the proposed Pacific

Property of the Tribe. "There is a very peculiar custom among the Sioux Indians," said Emanual French of Bismarck, S. D. "The Indians take kindly to European cooking utensils and aids to com-fort, and it is quite common for an exploring or picnic party to trade off kettles, frying pans and the like for skins or curiosities. A cooking utensil thus acquired becomes practically the common property of the tribe, on the general understanding. however, that whosoever borrows it shall pay for its use by leaving in it a portion of the food cooked. 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
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
