

VERTICAL HANDWRITING.

A New System of Penmanship That Is Advocated by Many Educators. The vertical system of handwriting,

which was introduced into the Samuel Ready school in Baltimore several years ago, is now occupying the attention of a number of northern educators, who advocate its use in the public schools. It is being introduced in many public schools, and its advocates say it promises to be the panmanship of the future. It is said the Samuel Ready school was the pioneer in introducing the vertical system into this country, having begun its use when the institution was opened in September, 1887. The little pupils there have acquired remarkable case and proficiency in their penmanship, which presents the rare combinations of perfeet legibility, mature style, and attractive appearance. In the vertical handwriting the writer sits squarely in front of the desk, with body erect, and the pen is held in an easy, straight position. Miss Helen J. Rowe, principal of the Samuel Ready school, says that she has found that the objection which some have made to the vertical system, that it destroys individuality in handwriting, is not based on good grounds. 
