They Might Pick Up. "Anyone who has watched the gulls and other fish-catching birds along our coast must have discovered how keen is their sight and how cunningly they discover a school of fish long before a fin has disturbed the surface of the water," said Captain E. M. Bates, of New Bedford. "Oftentimes when at sea I have tested the vision of gulls that happened near my ship, to the great amusement of the passengers. Going to the cabin I procured a small biscuit and returning to the deck prepared to show the passengers the wonderful powers of vision possessed by these birds. gull detected it and with a headlong


dart dipped into the foam and secured

Would Give Sane People Freedom. Another society is to be organized in New York for the rescue of sane persons illegally and improperly confined in asylums for the insane. The organization already in existence is conducted by a number of enthusiastic persons who are positive that at least thirty per cent of the inmates of asylums in the United States are sane and kept in duress by persons interested in depriving them of their liberty. Several members of the existing society have been in asylums as patients and they are the most vehement in their assertions. 
