WEALTH GOING TO WOMEN. Becoming More Numerous as Stock-holders in Eastern Factories.

In a large number of manufactur-ing concerns in Massachusetts, the affairs of which are covered by the latest report of the state bureau of labor statistics, there were 43.803 partners or stockholders in 1893, against 49,735 in 1892. The number of males included in the total for the latter year was greater, however. than that which was covered by the larger figures for 1893. There were 27,325 male partners or stockholders in 1893, and 27,311 in 1893. On the other hand, the number of women who had an interest in the manufactories dealt with by the report was 16,592 in 1983 against 15,410 in the year preceding. The partners or stockholders were 63.91 per cent males in 1892 and 27.56 per cent females. In 1893 the proportions were 28.38 per cent of fem ales and 62.12 per cent of males. The change thus shown to have taken place in one year is a curious hint of the tendency of the times to place more and more of the times to place more and more of the property of the world, and especially of the United States, in the possession of women. Hungarians are making prepara-tions on a grand scale for a millenial exhibition, and the government addressed a prayer to the emperor that he might lend them all the his-toric relics in his possession which have any connection with Hungarian history. The emperor granted the re-quest and a number of Hungarian historians and antiquarians have come to Vienna to study the imperial col-lection and make a list of the objects in question. They have selected a great number, which represent a value of 3,000,000 florins—if the value of unique historical relics can be expressed in figures. Among these objects are copies of the portraits in re-lief of King Mathias, Corvinus and Queen Beatrix, a bronze bust of Mary. queen of Hungary; bronze reliefs of Adrien Fries, illustrating the Hungarian wars; the remnants of the crown of King Andreas and the imperial globe, dating from the fourteenth century; the double cross that belonged to Lewis the Great, with relics of Christ's cross; a map of Hungary engraved in a metal plate, a nautilusshaped cup, with arms of the Batthyanis. 


