The Burwell Progress, Garfield county, extends sympathy to Holt in its populist affliction. Garfield is also a populist county. Misery does not like solitude.

The West Point Republican celebrated its 25th birthday by issuing a pictorial edition for its home town. Editor Langer is to be congratulated upon the success of his enterprise.

The populist county attorney of Antelope county recommended that the county clerk be allowed \$50 for services rendered as clerk of the board. Clerk Bethea has over looked a bet.

The governor in his thanksgiving proclamation suggests that the day be observed with "solemnity." No doubt the governor will take "his" that way. It is said the election effected him in that manner.

It is not required that the Plain Dealer offer testimony to prove that Bro. Bates has not been on its editorial staff for months. The character of the paper during the past few months is evidence conclusive.

The Page New Era admits that the populist campaign was pushed along and invigorated by the use of both liquor and money, but adds that the ends justified the means. An open confession is said to be good for the soul.

The wicked flourish for awhile like the green bay tree, but sooner or later get their just deserts. In support of this proposition we cite the case of the Omaha Bee vs. the people of Douglas county, opinion rendered at the last election.

The last Smudge perpetrated a labored editorial on a long suffering but forbearing public. The heading under which it appeared was "From the Sublime to the Ridiculous." It was easy to locate the "ridiculous" part of the article, but the sublime—but that's a different thing. If it contained any sublimity it was altogether too deep for ordinary perception.

THE Stuart Ledger has cause to feel proud of the active part it took in the campaign and the warm support it gave the republican ticket.

O'NEILL'S vote always portrays the broad and liberal minds of the voters. They allow no sectional matters to enter into a political contest. A "BRAZEN untruthful upstart" is the way the Sun refers to Secretary Morton. Mr. Morton settled upon the prairies of Nebraska before the editor of the Sun was born, and has always been a potent factor in the upbuilding of our state. His appointment to the responsible position which he now occupies came to him not as a recognition of the value his state had been to the president, but in acknowledgement of his peculiar fitness for the position and his general qualifications as a citizen and a statesman. THE FRONTIER has little respect for Mr. Morton's politics, but it has high regard for him as secretary of agriculture and cannot allow the Sun's boorish insult to pass unrebuked. To see a thing like McHugh attempting to criticize a man like the sage of Arbor Lodge is enough to move a graven image to tears.
