



To any one who cares for liberty and believes it to be the sole moral hygiene of a nation the state of Italy at the present time is painful and humiliating. AERIAL TRAVEL,

Limitations Which Surround Animals in Their Flight.

It is evident that not one of these would-be flying machine men has ever seriously undertaken to solve the prob-lem mentally, says the Pittsburg Dispatch. There is but one way of getting through the air by mechanical action, and that is by cleavage. There are really only two forms of cleavage, the one as represented by wing action as applied by insects and birds, the other a rotary action as represented by the screw of a steamer. To the application of the wing principle there is a limit set by natural law, just as in animal forms there is a limit set to either by pedal or quadrupedal construction There is, perhaps, no form of cleavage that represents the expenditure of force more economically than wing action as manifested in the flight of a wild goose. Here is an exceptionally large avoirdupois for the wing area, but the bird cannot carry any additional weight. In the birds of prey, the body is lighter in proportion to wing surface-a light, compact frame, but immense muscular
