THE older the campaign grows the more apparent it becomes that Bryan cannot carry Nebraska.

THE men who started out to make a monkey out of Tom Watson are not as confident of success as they were.

ARRANGEMENTS have been made for a joint debate between John L. Webster and M. F. Harrington, to take place at Dixon next Saturday.

THE populists are figuring on carrying Holt county for Bryan by a majority of 800. They always place their figures about four times too high.

WHEN Judge Kinkaid received the nomination for supreme judge the Sun demanded that he immediately resign from the district bench so that his successor might be elected this fall. The question now is, why does the Sun not demand the resignation of Superintendent Jackson?

WE AGREE with Senator Wolcott as to there being a need for "less hysterics and more common sense," not only in Colorado, but everywhere else.

IT is painful to hear a laboring man vociferating in favor of free coinage. He knows about as little as the pensioner who thinks free silver would benefit him.

THE New York man's offer to bet \$10,000 to \$5,000 that McKinley will be elected has not yet been taken up. The Bryanites talk confidence, but when it comes to backing it with cash they are out of it.

IT HAS been found expedient to release Bryan from the editorial management of the World-Herald.
