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PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL **AMENDMENTS**

The following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, are submitted to the electors of the State of Nebrasks, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 2 ' D., 1896:

A joint rem proposing to amend sections four (4), and five (5,) of article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relating to number of judges of the supreme court and their term of office.

court and their term of office.

Be it resolved and enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:
Section 1. That section two (2) of article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska he amended so as te read as follows:

Section 2. The supreme court shall until otherwise provided by law, consist of five (5) judges, a majority of whom shall be necessary to form a quorum or to pronounce a decision. It shall have original jurisdiction in cases relating to revenue, civil cases in which the state shall be a party, mandamus, quo warranto, habeas corpus, and such appellate jurisdiction, as may be provided by law.

Bection 2. That section four (4) of article six (6) of the Contaitution of the State of Nebraska, be amended so as to read as follows:

six (6) of the Contaitution of the State of Nebraska, be amended so as to read as follows:

Bection 4. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the electors of the state at large, and their term of office, except as hereinafter provided, shall be for a period of not less than five (3) years as the legislature may prescribe.

Bection 3. That section five (5) of article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, be amended to read as follows:
Bection 5. At the first general election to be held in the year 1836, there shall be elected two (2) judges of the supreme court one of whom shall be elected for a term of two (7) years, one for the term of four (4) years, and at each general election thereafter, there shall be elected one judge of the supreme court for the term of five (5) years, unless otherwise provided by law; Provided, That the judges of the supreme court whose terms have not expired at the time of holding the general election of 1896, shall continue to hold therefore for the remainder of the term for which they were respectively commissioned.

Bec. 13 The judges of the supreme and district courts shall receive for their services such compensation as may be provided by law, payable quarterly.
The legislature shall at its first session after the adoption of this amendment, three-fifths of the members elected to each house concurring, establish their compensation. The compensation so established shall not be changed oftener than once in four years, and in no event unless two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature concurtherein.

Each railroad commissioner shall hold his office for a term of three years, beginning on the first Thursday after his election, and until his successor is elected and qualified; Provided, however, That at the first general election held after the adeption of this amendment there shall be elected three railroad commissioners, one for the period of one year, one for the period of three years. The governor, secretary of state, suditor of public accounts, and treasurer shall reside at the capital during their term of office; they shall keep the public records, books and papers there and shall perform such duties as may be required by law.

Provided, The board created by section in of this article is empowered to bell from time to time any of the securities belonging to the permanent school fund and invest the proceeds arising therefrom in any of the securities belonging to the permanent school fund and invest the proceeds arising therefrom in any of the securities numerated in this section bearing a higher rate of interest, whenever an opiortunity for better investment is presented;

And provided further, That when any warrant upon the state treasurer regularly issued in pursuance of an appropriation by the legislature and secured by the levy of a tax for its payment, shall be presented to the state treasurer for payment, and there shall not be any money in the proper fund to pay such warrant, the board created by section 1 of this article may direct the state treasurer to pay the amount due on such warrant from moneys in his hands belonging to the permanent school fund of the state, and he shall hold taid warrant as an investment of said permanent school fund. 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
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
