ORDINANCE NO. 76

An ordinance fixing the salary and compensation of the officers and employees of the city of O'Neill, Nebraska. City weighmaster one-half of the fees received for weighing on city scales. Night watchman, per month, \$25. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
