ORDINANCE No. 78.
An ordinance relating to closing saloons, billiard halls and places of similar resort, and repealing ordinance No. 77 and sections 7 and 8 of ordinance No. 3.
Section 1. All saloons, billiard halls and places of similar resort shall be closed and kept closed between the hours of 11:30 P. M. and 5 o'clock A. M. And all saloons, billiard halls and places of similar resort shall be closed and kept closed during the first day of the week commonly called Sunday.
Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall on conviction thereof be fined any sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 and shall pay the costs of prosecution.
Section 3. Ordinance No. 77 and sections 7 and 8 of ordinance No. 3 and all ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.
Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

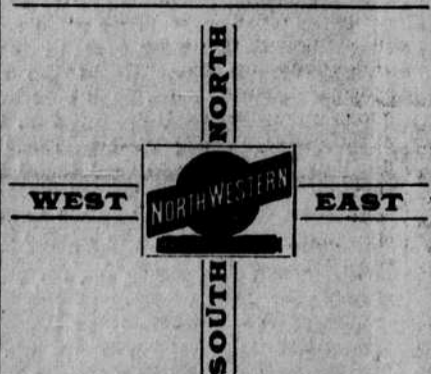
NOTICE OF SETTLEMENT.
