EVENING SESSION.

Meeting was called to order pursuant to adjournment and listened to the report of the committee on constitution and by-laws, as follows:

The name of this organization shall be the Elkhorn Valley Editorial Association. The officers of the association shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and an executive committee composed of four members and the president.

These officers shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the association, except the executive committee who shall be appointed by the president, and serve for a term of one year.

Annual dues of this association shall be twenty-five cents.

The association shall hold its annual meeting on the first Saturday in June.

The duties of the officers of this association shall be the same as the duties of like officers in similar organizations.

ORDINANCE No. 78.

An ordinance relating to closing saloons, billiard halls and places of similar resort, and repealing ordinance No. 77 and sections 1 and 2 of ordinance No. 3.

Section 1. All saloons, billiard halls and places of similar resort shall be closed and kept closed between the hours of 11:30 p. m. and 5 o'clock a. m. And all saloons billiard halls and places of similar resort shall be closed and kept closed during the first day of the week commonly called Sunday.

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall on conviction thereof be fined any sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 and shall pay the costs of prosecution.

Section 3. Ordinance No. 77 and sections 1 and 2 of ordinance No. 3 and all ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

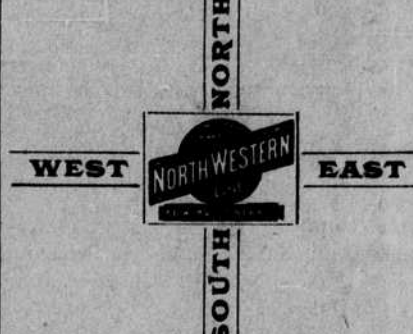
