Bix, in State Journal: The accident that befell O. C. Bates, of Atkinson, recalls again the history of his long itinerary in country journalism. It was thirty-one years ago that he founded the Northern Vindicator at Estherville, Ia., and by the originality of his writings gave it much more than a state wide reputation. He coined the word "blizzard" to designate the storms of wind and snow peculiar to that then barren and desolate region. He left Estherville the year that Samuel J. Tilden wasn't elected president, and has since edited various papers in southern Iowa and elsewhere. He finally came to Nebraska to renew his youth, and has spoiled his prospects by falling out of a two-story window and breaking

Monday morning, about 1 o'clock, O. C. Bates was seriously injured by falling from an open second story window of the Nightengale brick building on Main street to the plank sidewalk below, a distance of about fifteen feet. Both of his wrists were broken, his left elbow was thrown out of joint, and he was severely bruised and may be seriously injured internally, although it is impossible to tell as yet. Before retiring Sunday night Mr. Bates placed a chair up to the window and sat down where he could get the benefit of a cool breeze, telling his wife that he was going to take a smoke before he went to bed. Some time after Mrs. Bates was awakened by hearing his pipe drop to the floor, and knowing that he had gone to sleep in the chair she called and asked if he had not better go to bed. She heard the chair move as he roused in response to her call, and then heard him fall, but thought it was only to the floor until lying on the sidewalk below. Night-Humpal was promptly on the e and soon summoned assistance, and Mr. Bates was carried up to his m and Dr. Blackburn summoned at

once. Mr. Bates fell with enough force to break a two inch plank in the sidewalk where he struck, and as he is over sixty years of age and rather heavy it is a miracle that he was not killed instantly. He must have fallen through the M. F. Harrington, of O'Neill, is in window while he was still asleep, as he says he had no recollection of anything until he felt himself falling. Mr. Bates is a newspaper man and is quite prominently known over the state. Up to the present time he is doing as well as could be expected, and it is to be hoped that his injuries will not prove fatal and that his recovery may be speedy.


