Hayward Leads the Republican Ticket to Victory in this Good old State.

MAJORITY OF ABOUT SIX IN LEGISLATURE

Which Insures the Election of a Republican United States Senator to Succeed William Vincent Allen.



The election is over and once more the populist forces have carried Holt county but by a greatly reduced majority. Poynter carries the county by about 350 over Hayward. O'Neill gets 245 over King; Peck gets about 225 over Butler and Carton gets about 150 over Moss. Following is the vote by townships:

O'Neill carries Boyd county by about twenty-six, and Garfield by twenty-two and will have a majority in the district of about 825.
