Negro Employment in Washington. The condition of the negro in Washington has been made the subject of investigation by John W. Ross, who for 12 years has been one of the district commissioners. In the district government as officials, clerks and messengers are 50 negroes receiving annual salaries aggregating \$28,000. There are 40 negroes on the police force in various capacities drawing \$1,400 a year, while there are 600 negro men and women in the school system a teachers, whose yearly pay is \$290,000. These, with the negroes in various public institutions and the water, street and sewer departments, bring the total up to 2,600, drawing an annual compensation of about \$1,000,000.
