and refuse to give your petitioner credit for \$200 due your petitioner from Holt county, as county attorney, for the months of January, February and March? Was it because your special committee was appointed to do dirty work, or is this "special committee" alone to blame for what they have done? Why dia your special committee, in their nost remarkable report, recommend that the board request that your petitioner at once file with the county clerk a full and complete statement of all receipts and disbursements of mor ey collected by him and belonging to Holt county after they had brought in their false and malicious report? Was any county officer in this or any other state ever requested by a "special committee" or any other committee to file a statement after they had gone throught the farce of checking up his office? Why did not your honorable body call upon your petitioner for a statement before you appointed a "special committee"?

Why was the chairman of your honorable board instructed to demand of your petitioner that he pay into the county treasury, at once all money in his hands belonging to Holt county? Was it not for the purpose of conveying the idea to your honorably body, and the people of Holt county, that your petitioner was short in his accounts with Holt county?

Your petitioner begs leave to consider that when a person has faithfully and conscientiously, for more than three years, discharged the office of county attorney in a county the size of Holt, that his reputation, his character and his family be entitled to a fair consideration and honorable treatment by the county board of the county for whom he has labored faithfully for years, in the attempt to put the people in said county and the government of said county in a good, solid financial condition.

Therefore your petitioner respectfully prays that a committee of three be appointed to employ an expert accountant to check up the books, records and accounts of your petitioner as county attorney; that said committee be appointed as follows: One by your petitioner, who hereby names S. B. Howard, one by your honorable body, and these two to elect a third person, these three to compose the committee. That the said committee have power to employ an expert accountant (a competent person) and to agree on the compensation said expert shall receive per day for the entire work as the judgment of the committee is best. That the expenses of said committee and the compensation agreed upon for the accountant by the committee, be provided for and paid as follows: If the expert shall find that your petitioner is in debt to Holt county one dollar or one cent your petitioner shall settle all claims of said committee and of said exshore. 




