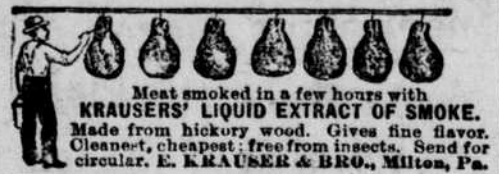

Honor to Whom Honor is Due.

The railroads have been greatly abused as soulless corporations that were grinding the life blood out of the people. THE LIVE STOCK MARKET.

Latest Quotations from South Omaha and Kansas City.

Union Stock Yards—Cattle—There was a good supply of cattle, which gave buyers an opportunity to pound prices down a trifle on such grades as they did not happen to want. The better grades of beef steers held about steady, though the market was not particularly active. The common to fair grades, however, were very slow sale and bids were generally a little lower. The cow market was in rather unsatisfactory condition today. Buyers started out from the first to get their supplies at a lower figure and they would not buy unless they could get what they wanted for less money than they paid yesterday. Some of the choicest bunches of heifers may not have been much, if any, lower, but aside from a few prize bunches the market was very slow and lower. Bulls were also a little weak today and the same was true of stags, but calves did not show much of any change. The stocker and feeder trade held good and firm, the better grades being picked up in good season at strong prices. There is ample demand at the present time for all the stock cattle of good quality and weight that are being received and as a result the prices paid are very satisfactory.

Hogs—There was another fairly liberal supply of hogs and, as all other points reported a drop in values, the market here opened up 74¢/10c lower. The bulk of the early sales went at \$5.15 and \$5.17 1/2 price. The hogs changed hands at a quite lively rate at those prices and it soon became evident that packers all wanted a good man hog and as a result sellers held their droves at strong prices. Packers finally raised their hands and began paying \$5.17 1/2 for the general run of medium weights and \$5.20 for the prime heavy hogs.

Sheep—There was a good liberal run of sheep for the latter part of the week, but the market was in fairly good shape. Good heavyweight stuff was about steady with yesterday, but the heavy sheep were a little slow and lower. For the week they may be called 10¢/15c lower, and in some cases more. It is the lighter weight stuff that seems to be in the best demand and such kinds are not so much lower for the week. Lambs held about steady today. Colorado stuff sold as high as \$5.20, which is only a trifle lower than what the same kind was selling for the first of the week.

Cattle—Beef steers steady, 15¢/25c higher; stockers and feeders, \$3.50/4.00; western fed steers, \$4.25/4.50; calves and yearlings, \$3.85/4.15; cows, \$3.25/4.25; heifers, \$3.50/4.75; canners, \$2.40/3.10; bulls, \$3.00/4.50; calves, \$5.00/5.75.

Hogs—Market lower, top, \$5.30; bulk of sales, \$5.15/5.25; heavy, \$5.20/5.30; mixed packers, \$5.15/5.25; light, \$5.00/5.15; pigs, \$3.50/3.75.

Sheep and Lambs—Lambs steady, muttons strong; western lambs, \$5.15/5.40; western yearlings, \$4.25/4.75; western ewes, \$3.50/4.25; \$4.50/5.00; ewes, \$3.50/4.25; castrates, \$3.25/3.50.

FINE WEATHER ON THE RANGE.

Condition of West Nebraska Cattle Could Not Be Better.

GERING, Neb., Feb. 4.—Up to the present time, better conditions for cattle on the range could hardly have been possible. Such an open winter at this time in January is very unusual, yet it is fortunate that such is the case this winter. The range was not as good as usual, owing to late rains, and the high price of hay has taken hundreds of carloads out of the country. Cattle now, however, are in splendid condition, and on account of the mildness of the winter not so much feeding has been done as is usual. Very severe and long continued storms will have to occur or cattle will go on the winter in the usually fine condition. There are more cattle in the country than ever before, as many ranchmen held on in preference to selling last fall, when there was a considerable slump in the market prices, hence a shipment of considerable volume may be anticipated during the season of 1901 from the range section of the north Platte valley.

WINDSOR IS IN WAITING

Town Thronged With Visitors for Queen's Funeral.

WINDSOR, England, Feb. 2.—The ancient town of Windsor has undergone a great transformation. Its usually quiet streets are thronging with visitors. The decorations and preparations for the final scenes continue, but perhaps the strangest matter is the large number of wreaths which continue to arrive from all over the world. These are so numerous that the authorities are at a loss to know how to deal with them and again it has been necessary to exclude the public from the cloisters, which are already overflowing.

Final arrangements have been made at St. George's Chapel Royal. The purple-covered bier stands awaiting its royal burden. Four shields adorn its sides, each with a golden monogram, "V. R. I."

At Frogmore the cover of the great stone sarcophagus has been rolled away. When the queen's body is laid beside that of the prince consort the stone will be replaced and finally sealed, a marble figure being placed above it.

It is expected that some 1,550 persons will be present at the ceremony in St. George's chapel, although only a portion will be able to witness the ceremony. The little Prince Edward of Cornwall and York and Princess Elizabeth of Hesse arrived at Windsor castle this afternoon.

President McKinley's and Mrs. Garfield's wreaths came today.

ABYSSINIANS IN A FIGHT

London.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—A telegram to the Exchange Telegraph company from Cairo says severe fighting is reported in Abyssinia. The number engaged is said to be 7,000. The foreign office officials know nothing of any difficulty in King Menelik's territory, but it is not unlikely, they think, that certain malcontent chiefs may have taken advantage of King Menelik's absence from the capital to foment an insurrection.
