Odd Marine Reilc.

An ancient ship was recently discovered in the bed of the old River i.ea, in England. The vessel, found at a depth of seven feet below the surface, is about fifty feet long and is constructed of oak throughout, with the exception of the keel, which is of elm. The ribs of the boat are secured to the sides by tree-nails, while the timbers are secured with crude iron nails. The floor boards are fastened together with nails and the calking is done with felt. Antiquarians think it belonged to the fleet with which King Alfred the Great fought the Danes.

Use Rhone River Power.

Switzerland presents an object lesson in the practical applications of scientific principles. Geneva now derives all the electricity it requires for public and private lighting and the traction of its cars from the impetus of the Rhone as it rushes out of Lake Leman, and there is still left an enormous amount of power unused. Electric railways and lighting everywhere are supplied by the innumerable waterfalls, while heat and power to an incalculable extent can be derived from the same source.
