**Less Beer Drunk in Munich.**  
Munich's reputation for beer drinking is in danger. The city is still far ahead of any other in the quantity consumed, but in 1901 it drank fifteen litres per head less than in 1900, only 341 litres per man, that is to say less than a litre a day. This is ascribed in part to the falling off in the number of strangers who visit the Athens on the Isar.

**Waitresses on Japanese Railroads.**  
Refreshment cars on some of the Japanese railroads are now attended by waitresses. The girls are carefully chosen and made to pass quite a stringent examination. The waitresses take rank as railway officials and wear a pretty costume, in modified national style, with Western improvements. The new departure has been a complete success, and the railway authorities are greatly satisfied with their girl attendants.

The Baltimore school board has appropriated \$100 to secure the services of some well-informed citizen in the selection of names of prominent Marylanders of the past to designate the 100 public schools in the city.
