ATKINSON.
W. P. O'Brien informs the Graphic that he has sold a two-thirds interest in his ranch near Saratoga to Troutner and Milner, of Charles City, Iowa, for \$18,000. The parties are old friends of Mr. O'Brien and made the deal simply as an investment. Mr. O'Brien remains in full charge.

The assessor is enjoying his job. He told us this week that he has uncovered thousands of dollars' worth of personal property in Atkinson and vicinity, on which the owners say they have never paid taxes before. This will result in a reduction of the levy and a consequent decrease in taxes for those who have always put in their property at its honest value. It does Donat's heart good to get action on the shirkers.

Many changes in business circles in Atkinson took place last week just too late to receive mention in the Graphic. J. F. Brady purchased the stock of goods of the Alleshouse Mercantile Co. J. P. McNichols purchased Dan Hall's place. We understand Mr. Hall intends going to Canada. Mr. Dormann, of Wisner, purchased the general merchandise store of J. B. Sturdevant. Mr. Sturdevant was one of Atkinson's first merchants, and general regret will be felt at his retirement. However, after so many years behind the counter no one can blame him for desiring a change.—The Graphic.

NEBRASKA NOTES
F. E. Allen, a railroad engineer at Alliance, has recently come into the possession of a razor which was the property of an illustrious ancestor, General Ethan Allen of revolutionary war times.

The supreme court has decided that breweries cannot take out saloon license in this state except in their own name, which will have the effect of changing the proprietor's name of a good many grog shops, as two-thirds of the saloons of the state are owned by the breweries.

Star-Journal: The latter part of May Ainsworth will be visited by the majority of the bankers in the counties comprising group number seven, of the state bankers' association. The group convention will be held here. There will be representatives from as far east as Oakdale and from the west end of Gherry county.

According to a statement sent out from Lincoln Nebraska cattle will have to scratch for a living this spring, as Texas itch has spread among the herds on the ranges of the northwestern section and is even making its appearance in the eastern portions of the state. No animal with the ailments can be shipped to market according to the quarantine ruling of the bureau of animal industry of the national administration, and Nebraska stockmen are organizing to fight the disease.

Newport Republican: C. L. Beaumont was arraigned and tried by jury at district court Monday before Judge Harrington for forgery. Beaumont's story was that he was traveling for a grocery company and had formerly been in the U. S. army. While at Long Pine he met and old acquaintance, who was formerly in the army, by the name of C. A. Elliot. He made a trip to Springfield and again met Elliot, who gave him a check for \$45. He returned to Bassett and

walked to Newport, hired three livery teams; cashed the check on the Brown county bank at the Rock county state bank and boarded the evening freight for Long Pine where he took the midnight train for Chadron, admitting on cross examination by Prosecuting Attorney Douglas that he had been drinking. The jury found him guilty and he was sentenced by Judge Harrington to the penitentiary for two years.

The Times-Tribune tells of a fearful struggle between Jerome Aldrich, who is prominent in live stock circles in this state and who lives near Beaver City, and an infuriated bull. He went to the feed lot back of the barn at the usual hour to attend his stock, when he was attacked by the bull and a desperate battle ensued. Mr. Aldrich had a pitch fork which was found on the scene of the encounter with tines twisted, bent and covered with blood. The bull finally overpowered him and got him down and was crushing the life out of him with his great head, when with wonderful nerve and presence of mind, Mr. Aldrich secured his pocket knife and succeeded in blinding the bull with it. As soon as his eyes were put out, the bull walked away and Mr. Aldrich, bruised and bleeding and with ten ribs broken, succeeded in making his way to the house, a distance of twenty-five or thirty rods. It is thought he will recover.


