The last run of 2900 miles from Madeira to New York was made at an average speed of 13.8 knots. The whole distance was made under natural draught. The department of agriculture has issued a report on "The Nation's Farm Surplus," prepared by George K. Holmes, chief of the division of foreign markets. It gives \$4,500,000,000 as a conservative estimate of the value of the farm products of this country not fed to live stock in 1903, on the basis of the census valuation. The value of the exported farm products of this country was, in 1903, \$878,479,451, and the highest value reached during the last eleven years was \$951,628,331 in 1901, due chiefly to cotton.
