

COUNTY VALUATION The grand aggregate assessesed valuation of all the property ip Holt county not including railroads and

others corporate property, as returned by the assessors, is \$2,480,448. The assessment, is made on a one-fith valuation. The railroad and other corporate property is estimated at \$2,900,000, which will bring the total assessed valuation of all property in the county close to five and a half millions. Under the operations of the new revenue law there is a great increase in personal valuation due largely to the assessment of property that had never beford been listed. The returns show that the personal property exceeds the real estate in the towns by nearly \$40,000. The following table shows the assessment by precincts, with comparisons for the years 1903 and 1904:



These figures are as returned by the assessors and are subject to change by the board of equalization now at workladjusting the list. There will probably be considerable alteration in real estate values as much of the real estate is valued at double the price the owners ask for it.
