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### County Convention.

To the Republican Electors of Holt County, Nebraska:

Notice is hereby given that a republican delegate convention of the republican electors of Holt county, Nebraska, will be held in O'Neill, in said county, on Saturday, the 9th day of September, 1905, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of making nominations for the following public offices: treasurer, clerk, sheriff, judge, superintendent of public instruction, coroner and surveyor, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the convention.

The Chicago and Northwestern railway system reports nearly a million dollars increase in net earnings for the year ending June 30, over the previous year. The total net earnings for the system were \$17,095,963. The report shows a profit of 45 per cent of the gross earnings. The railroad industry is not the only one to enjoy prosperity in these piping times of peace and plenty. We, of the rural districts, are wont to complain of excessive tolls levied by the railroads, and yet nobody shares in the general prosperity more than the man in the country. Right here on the O'Neill market hogs are worth \$5 per hundred pounds and corn 38 cents a bushel, and the farmer doesn't have to pay the railroads any tolls to bring his hogs and corn to town. The farmers as well as the man in business have been keeping out of the bankruptcy court pretty well since the Dingley tariff took the place of the Wilson-Gorman act, and it is doubted if they will want to take the chances on a change soon.

Neligh Leader: In the halcyon days of the populist party it held its convention regardless of any other party on earth; declaring its principles and nominating its candidates in advance of all others. With the democracy it had hardly a speaking acquaintance, and a sure means of defeating a candidate in a populist convention was to intimate even that his populism was tainted with democracy. All this has changed. We now find the populists making up their issues after the republicans have held their conventions, hoping to reach some advantage through hoped for mistakes of republicans. The party is no longer one of principle, but of expediency. It seeks fusion with the democrats and will sacrifice everything for a few votes,

hoping to regain control of a few minor offices. Starting with high ideals, even if eccentric, the populist party has degenerated into a mass of office seekers, disgruntled politicians, intermixed with a mass of socialism, unpractical reformers and dreamers, making a pessimistic misfit, dangerous to free government and society. These facts have become recognized by fair-minded men, who have determined that the only hope for reform measures lies in the rank and file of the republican party.

However, the "vicious revenue law" is bringing the delinquents to limerick.
